# **A Short Story**

## **A Mighty Fortress**

God is our refuge and strength, an ever-present help in trouble. Therefore we will not fear, though the earth give way and the mountains fall into the heart of the sea... The LORD Almighty is with us; the God of Jacob is our fortress. (Psalm 46:1-2a,7 NIV1984)

Psalm 46 was the inspiration for the words of Martin Luther's hymn, "A mighty fortress is our God, a trusty shield and weapon..." It was published about 490 years ago, approximately 10 years after Luther had written and posted his 95 theses. At this time in his life, between 1527 and 1529, the reformer continued to battle with fellow theologians for the clear and correct proclamation of God's Word and an accurate administration of the sacraments of Holy Baptism and Holy Communion.

At least five years before this, in September of 1522, Luther had guickly finished his translation of the Greek Scriptures into German. In 6 months, while hiding at the Wartburg Castle, he had completed a version of the New Testament of the Bible which could be read and studied by the common folk of Germany in their own language!

Just one year before this, Martin Luther stood before Charles V, king of the Holy Roman Empire. Emperor Charles had ordered Luther to recant, or take back, his writings and teachings in which Luther had opposed various doctrines of the Roman Catholic Church because they did not agree with God's Word. But Luther would not recant. On April 18, 1521, he replied to his accusers, "Unless I am refuted and convicted by testimonies of the Scriptures or by clear arguments (since I believe neither the Pope nor the Councils alone; it being evident that they have often erred and contradicted themselves), I am conquered by the Holy Scriptures quoted by me, and my conscience is bound in the Word of God: I can not and will not recant any thing, since it is unsafe and dangerous to do any thing against the conscience. Here I stand! I cannot do otherwise. God help me! Amen."

Four years before his trial before the emperor, 500 years ago, on October 31, 1517, Martin Luther nailed his 95 theses to the community bulletin board of his day, the wooden door of the Castle Church in Wittenberg, Germany. Anyone could pause to read Luther's statements regarding the sale of indulgences. The Roman Catholic Church was selling little slips of paper and promising to its customers that the purchase of these documents would get them or their loved ones just a little closer to God. But Luther learned from the Bible and clearly proclaimed that sinners are rescued from guilt & eternal hellfire - not by their own work or merit, and certainly not by purchasing an indulgence from Johann Tetzel – sinners are released from sin, death, and the power of the devil only through the life and death of Jesus Christ.

On October 31, 1517, Martin Luther posted his 95 statements against indulgences, in an effort to publicly discuss the teachings of the church, and humbly submit to the Word of God. A return to the Bible was required. A reformation of the church was needed.

Five hundred years later, here we stand, fearlessly grounded in God's Word. Human tradition is not the basis for our theology. The declarations of sinful humanity do not shape our belief about the salvation of our eternal souls. We are saved from sin and hell by God's grace through faith in the Lord Jesus (Ephesians 2:8-9). We trust in one name for the forgiveness of our sins and for the certainty of an eternal home of peace with the Lord in heaven: Jesus is the only name given to us by which we are saved (Acts 4:12).

God is our refuge and strength. Trusting in Him for the salvation of our souls we have no reason to fear, in this life or ever. What a might fortress! Believing in our Savior Jesus Christ and building our eternal future on the unshakable foundation of His unchanging Word, we sing confidently and joyfully of our home in heaven with Him: Our victory is won; the kingdom's ours forever!



The Lord Jesus, on the night he was betrayed, took bread, and when he had given thanks, he broke it and said, "This is my body, which is for you; do this in remembrance of me." In the same way, after supper he took the cup, saying, "This cup is the new covenant in my blood; do this, whenever you drink it, in remembrance of me." 1 Corinthians 11:23-25

Often we have a hard time believing that we are loved. Men and women who have a keen awareness of their flaws will wonder if anyone can really love them. So we have a need to not only hear that we are loved, but also to receive tangible assurance of that love.

If we need that assurance from our fellow human beings, how much more do we need that assurance in our relationship to God?

God knows us so well. He knows how we feel. He knows what we need. Not only does he tell us in his Word that he loves us, he also gives us personal assurance of that love.

How does he do that? He does so in what Christians call Holy Communion or The Lord's Supper. In this special meal Jesus gives us bread that isn't just bread. He tells us, "This is my body." He also gives us wine to drink that isn't just wine. He says, "This is my blood."


Now before anyone gets grossed out, this isn't some kind of weird cannibalism. It's bread and wine that looks, smells, and tastes like bread and wine. Yet, in a way that we can't perceive or comprehend, Jesus tells us that with the bread and wine, his body and blood are really present in this Supper.

Here's why this is such a great gift. You may think, "I know that Jesus forgives all those other people out there, but I'm not really sure that he can forgive me." In Holy Communion, Jesus comes to you personally and says, "I love you. Your sins are all forgiven. You want proof? Here's the price I paid for you on the cross. This is my body which was sacrificed for you. This is my blood which I shed for you."

Whenever we receive the Lord's Supper, we remember Jesus' saving, self-sacrificing love for us, and we personally receive not only assurance of that love, but we also receive his forgiveness.

Next to faith, this is the highest art— to be content with the calling in which God has placed you. -Martin Luther

From Federation to Merger: The Birth of the Wisconsin Synod as We Know It Today October 22, 2017 3:00 pm at the Center for Mission and Ministry N16W23377 Stone Ridge Drive in Waukesha Presented by Professor John Brenner from

Wisconsin Lutheran Seminary

In 1892 the Wisconsin Synod, Minnesota Synod, and Michigan Synod formed a federation to carry out ministerial education, mission work, and other activities more efficiently. The federation was a logical development. The three synods were in geographical proximity; their early pastors came from the same mission houses and mission societies in Europe; and each had a similar theological development, moving from a weak Lutheranism to a strong confessional Lutheran position. In 1917 these three synods together with the Nebraska Synod merged to form the Wisconsin Synod with the basic synodical structure that we know today.

We will look at the eventful twenty-five years from the establishment of the federation to the final merger with an eye to understanding our synodical roots and learning lessons from a sometimes-tumultuous history.


Advent by Candlelight "My Soul in Stillness Waits"



## Luther's Seal Craft



Looking for a fun, easy craft to do with the kids or grandkids to celebrate the 500th anniversary of the Reformation?

Here is a simple Luther's Seal craft that you can make in just a few minutes!

Materials Needed (to make one): Blue construction paper Red construction paper Black marker White paper doily Gold glitter glue Glue Scissors

What To Do:

- 1. Cut a circle out of the blue construction paper, a little larger than the paper doily.
- 2. Glue the doily onto the blue circle.
- 3. Cut out a heart shape, smaller than the doily, from the red construction paper.
- 4. Using your black marker, draw a cross in the center of your heart.
- 5. Glue the heart onto the center of your doily.
- 6. With your glitter glue, line the outside of your blue circle with a gold ring.
- 7. Let dry.
