Happy New Year 2018!

Looking around as I write, it's beginning to look a lot like Christmas, and it's feeling a whole lot like Christmas, too. The decorations are up in church and at home. There's a dusting of snow on the ground outside. Our Advent preparation for Christmas is drawing to an end. Soon we'll be celebrating the birth of Jesus, our Savior. And then the odometer will roll into a new year...2018.

With the beginning of a new year, very likely you will experience some new things. But for many of us, the new year will not be much different than the old year now drawing to a close. In some areas of our lives that is very good, but not so much in other ways.

In my previous article, when I directed your attention to the start of the new Church Year, I shared with you the opening verses of Psalm 1: How blessed is the man who delights in the teaching of the LORD and meditates on it day and night (paraphrase of Psalm 1:1-2). The psalm continues like this: That person is like a tree planted by flowing streams of water, which bears its fruit in season. Its leaves do not wither. Everything he does is prosperous (paraphrase of Psalm 1:3).

Prosperous. Prosper. Prosperity. This is a sentiment that is often offered around this time of year. Have a Merry Christmas and a prosperous New Year! But what is meant by 'prosperity'?

In our society, to really prosper carries the connotation of 'living high on the hog' or 'living the American dream.' It brings to mind the idea of success in the various avenues of life – a respectable family, a wellpaying career, good grades, a comfortable home, luxury time – you get the picture. We work hard and then we can enjoy the benefits of our labors. Do you detect what is missing from that definition of prosperity?

Jesus.

As we began the new Church Year in Advent, with our focus on God's love for us in sending His Son into the world as our Savior, so we finish this calendar year celebrating the fact that Jesus was born in Bethlehem. The long-awaited Messiah did come to rescue us sinners. And we venture into 2018 seeking – like the wise men – this world's Redeemer in humble adoration and grateful praise.

We seek Him and find Him in the Gospel. Through regular use of God's Word and Sacraments we meet Jesus as He forgives our sins and refreshes us with the assurance of new life – eternal life – with Him. Empowered by the message of God's love for us, we approach Him with repentant hearts, confident of His generous outpouring of mercy and grace. And the Lord does not disappoint His believing children. He forgives us for all the times we didn't include Him or His Word in our plans. And He fills our hearts, lives, and homes with abundant blessings. He strengthens our faith and enables us to put that Christian faith into God-pleasing thoughts, words, and actions, expressed in our love for Him and one another.

Heading into the new calendar year, we may not achieve a 4.0, or land the perfect job, or raise a perfect family, or be financially wealthy beyond our wildest imaginations. But like a prosperous, fruit-bearing tree planted in a lush, watery area, we forge ahead confident of many blessings, and eager to serve our loving Lord. Firmly grounded in His Word we enjoy such great gifts as the forgiveness of sins, new life, and salvation through Jesus Christ our Lord.

The psalmist wrote: How blessed is the man who delights in the teaching of the LORD and meditates on it day and night. That person is like a tree planted by flowing streams of water, which bears its fruit in season. Its leaves do not wither. Everything he does is prosperous. We enter 2018 with our roots firmly planted in God's Word, and look forward to another year of His blessings. As you join me and your fellow believers in worship and Bible study, you will have a happy and blessed and prosperous New Year, dear Christian!



Unchanging Hope for an Ever-changing World

Jesus Christ is the same yesterday and today and forever. Hebrews 13:8

As one year ends and another begins, columnists and commentators look back at the previous year. What changed? What stayed the same? Whose passing did we mourn? Whose new arrival did we celebrate?

At the same time, we make predictions about the coming year. What will the new year hold? What will change? What will stay the same?



No matter what (or who) changes from one year to the next, there is one who never changes—Jesus Christ, the Son of God. What's in a Name?

We often refer to our synod as the WELS. What does that mean? Our acronym stands for the Wisconsin Evangelical Lutheran Synod.

Wisconsin is where three pastors serving German immigrants joined together in a common fellowship more than 150 years ago. It is still where more than half of our membership calls home—but now we have congregations and missions spread all across the globe.

Evangelical is a Greek word, literally translated "gospel oriented." It is an apt description, for the gospel of Jesus Christ is at the core of all we believe and proclaim. **Lutheran** refers to those who adhere to the teachings of Martin Luther, the leader of the Reformation in Germany. It was Luther who once again made clear that salvation is received through faith in Jesus as a gift from God (Ephesians 2:8,9).

Synod literally translated means "walking together." As a fellowship of Christians, we walk together as individuals and congregations sharing a common bond of faith in Jesus articulated in the Lutheran Confessions.
