From our Pastor

A Great and Mighty Wonder

There's no question that Christianity contains a number of paradoxes—facts which seem contradictory, but which are both true nonetheless. For example: How can God inhabit the entire universe (in Catechism we call it Omnipresence), yet be personally with us with his whole being (Matthew 28:20)? These paradoxes are why we call it "faith". We believe what God tells us in his word, even if we can't fully figure it out with our limited human minds. These are the Wonders of God!

The Christmas season presents us with perhaps a greater percentage of them these paradoxes, these wonders of God. The hymn "A Great and Mighty Wonder" begins with reporting a few of them.

"A virgin bears an infant." Even Mary herself asked about that one. It is so out of likelihood that a human woman could bear a child without the involvement of a man in the process, that it is impossible. The angel's response? "For nothing is impossible with God," (Luke 1:37).

"Who veils his deity." How can Christ be eternal God when he's born with all the characteristics of a human: having a birthday (a beginning), needing parents' protection, wetting his diapers, growing in size and skills as any other child? Not only is it not impossible, but in fact it's necessary for our salvation. He must be human in order to trade himself for us humans. He must be God in order to trade himself for ALL of us. He is eternal God, hiding (veiling) his greatness in human form, for our benefit (Philippians 2:6-8).

"The Word becomes incarnate and yet remains on high." While living in human flesh, Jesus did not temporarily stop being God. While he may have hidden his God-ness most of the time, it surfaces unmistakably in the miracles: healings, walking on water, his face transfigured with pure heavenly glory, rising from the dead (Romans 1:3,4).

Following the hymn's lead, we might go on to speak of other Christmas paradoxes. The King of all being born in such humble circumstances as an animal shelter—a stable when by all rights he should have premium neo-natal care by the finest doctors in the best hospital. The owner of the universe wrapped in strips of cloths as if he were the poorest of the poor (not even a decent baby blanket, how much could that have cost?). Suffering the pain of circumcision when he was the one person never in need of being connected through this rite to the Father (HIS Father). The Redeemer of all the human race, being redeemed himself by a pair of doves (Luke 2:24). Honored by noblemen from a foreign country (Matthew 3) rather than by his own people.

Wonder at it we will. They are Great and Mighty Wonders. But every aspect of Christmas is part of God's plan for our salvation. One small child's life of redeeming us begins in the darkness of the stable and carries on through the darkness of the tomb. God doesn't challenge us to figure it out, God calls us to believe. Let's follow Mary's example and *"treasure up all these things"* in our hearts. Ponder the wonders, but most of all, believe them.

Confession of Faith

If you confess with your mouth, "Jesus is Lord," and believe in your heart that God raised him from the dead, you will be saved. Romans 10:9

Did you ever wonder what made the early Christians willing to confess their faith in Jesus even when it brought persecution and death? Some Christians in the first century were stoned to death. Others were crucified. Still others were thrown to the lions. Yet they died praising Jesus, confessing him as their Lord and Savior.

In the centuries that followed, believers in Jesus continued preaching and teaching about him even at the threat of physical harm. One such man was Martin Luther who lived in Germany back in the 1500s. Luther boldly preached and taught about Jesus and became one of the most prolific writers about the Christian faith who has ever lived. When the authorities pressured him to take back what he had written, Luther firmly replied, "Here I stand. I cannot do otherwise. God help me. Amen!" As a result, he was labeled an outlaw and it was open season for anyone who wanted to take his life.

How could Luther and many other Christians confess their faith so boldly even at the threat of physical harm and death? Because they knew that something much better was waiting for them after this life. They knew that Jesus died for their sins and rose from the dead. Jesus' resurrection meant that God accepted his sacrifice for their sins and they too would rise to live forever in heaven.

Christians still have this hope today. We know this life is temporary. Nothing in this life is going to last. It will all eventually decay and perish. But those who trust in Jesus and confess him as their Lord and Savior will enjoy a perfect life with him that will never end. This changes the perspective and priorities of believers in Jesus. Confident in their eternal salvation through Jesus, Christians confess their faith in the Lord Jesus even to the point of death.

Come worship together this Christmas season and learn more about what confessing Christians throughout the ages have been willing to die for. Jesus is your Savior who came into this world to die and rise again so that you might live with him forever.



When the angels went away from them into heaven, the shepherds said to one another, "Let us go over to Bethlehem and see this thing that has happened, which the Lord has made known to us." ¹⁶ And they went with haste and found Mary and Joseph, and the baby lying in a manger.¹⁷ And when they saw it, they made known the saying that had been told them concerning this child.

The shepherds went and worshipped the baby, then went and told everyone they knew what they had heard and seen! An angel came to shepherds in a field nearby and told them about the birth of the Savior. The angel told them where to find Jesus.

And in the same region there were shepherds out in the field, keeping watch over their flock by night.⁹ And an angel of the Lord appeared to them, and the glory of the Lord shone around them, and they were filled with great fear. ¹⁰ And the angel said to them, "Fear not, for behold,] bring you good news of great joy that will be for all the people. "For unto you is born this day in the city of David a Savior, who is Christ the Lord. ¹² And this will be a sign for you: you will find a baby wrapped in swaddling cloths and lying in a manger."
