From our Pastor

About a year ago, Pastor Roger Riedel received and accepted a call to Oronoco, Minnesota. Some members of Peace were upset that he would move away and serve somewhere else. Before he left, Pastor Riedel used this section of the monthly newsletter to explain the calling process and to share the reasoning why a pastor might choose to accept a call to a new place, when things were going well at the original congregation.

I don't wish to rehash any of that thinking, just encourage you now to put the shoe on the other foot. Once you were perhaps saddened that your pastor left for a new ministry, while that congregation rejoiced over receiving a new servant. Now you rejoice, and a pair of congregations in Minnesota are grieving the loss of a servant. Pray for the congregations in Balaton and Tyler—just as the people of Oronoco once prayed for you.

Your prayers have been answered with the result that you will soon install a full-time pastor to serve you. But the needs of ministry go on everywhere.

In fact, Jesus said, "The harvest is plentiful, but the workers are few." No congregation would ever need a new pastor if it were the other way around. The exact number of pastors in the WELS would serve the exact same number of congregations in the WELS, and no one would ever move. We are thankful that the number of congregations is greater than the number of pastors available for this simple reason—the kingdom of God is growing! If no new congregations were ever formed through home and world mission work, then there would be no need for pastors to leave where they are and to serve a new set of people who hadn't been able to hear the gospel before. It's the challenge of the Apostle Paul. He wished he could stay longer in various cities (Rome, Corinth, Ephesus), but he always was led to new parts of the world to share the gospel there (Romans 15:20-24). Pastoral movement is one evidence of the God's growing kingdom.

We're not blind to the fact that more ministers are needed, and that too few can bring complications to a greater number of congregations. For a while now, the leadership of the WELS and local congregations have been concerned over the shrinking number of available pastors. However, we might pray that there will always be more places to go with the gospel, than there are people to go there. When we are without a minister, it keeps us humble, it keeps us praying, it keeps us encouraging young members to consider ministry, it keeps us rejoicing that God is taking his word to new people. May it ever be, that's there's always at least one more congregation than the number of ministers to fill those callings. May it really be, that there's always dozens of empty congregations seeking a servant or two. It means God hasn't given up on having his word spread!

On a personal note, I thank you that you have allowed me to serve you in the interim between pastors. After 29 years in the teaching ministry, the day-to-day work of pastoral ministry had become quite unfamiliar. Those years of parish work were a long time ago. You have allowed me to stretch myself back into weekly sermon writing; resuming regular Confirmation and Bible classes; sharing personal counseling; and planning church events. I am probably more ready for full-time parish ministry now than I was 10 months ago. We'll see where the Lord sees fit to take that.

May God grant you members of Peace Evangelical Lutheran a joyful time of working together with Pastor Steven Tews, and blessings as you serve God's kingdom in whatever way you are given. But keep your prayers going that God keep expanding his kingdom, so that pastors keep getting calls and keep moving from place to place. It's a good thing!






Allan Metzer
