

April 2020

Palm Sunday (John 12:12-15)



The next day, the large crowd that had come for the Festival heard that Jesus was on his way to Jerusalem. Taking palm branches, they went out to meet him, shouting, "Hosanna! Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord-the King of Israel!"

Jesus found a young donkey and sat on it, just as it is written:

Do not be afraid, daughter of Zion. Look! Your King is coming, seated on a donkey's colt.

Maundy Thursday (Matthew 26:26-30; 36-39; 47-49)



While they were eating, Jesus took bread, blessed and broke it, and gave it to the disciples. He said, "Take, eat, this is my body." Then he took the cup, gave thanks, and gave it to them, saying, "Drink from it all of you, for this is my blood of the new testament, which is poured out for many for the forgiveness of sins. I tell you that I will not drink of this fruit of the vine from now until that day when I drink it new with you in my Father's kingdom." After they sang a hymn, they went out to the Mount of Olives.

Then Jesus went with them to a place called Gethsemane. He told his disciples, "Sit here, while I go over there and pray." He took with him Peter and the two sons of Zebedee, and he began to be sorrowful and distressed.

Then he said to them, "My soul is very sorrowful, even to the point of death. Stay here, and keep watch with me." He went a little farther, fell on his face, and prayed. He said, "My Father, if it is possible, let this cup pass from me. Yet not as I will, but as you will."

While Jesus was still speaking, suddenly Judas (one of the Twelve) arrived. With him was a large crowd with swords and clubs, who came from the chief priests and elders of the people. Now the betrayer had given them a sign: "The one I kiss is the man. Arrest him."

Immediately he went to Jesus and said, "Greetings, Rabbi!" and kissed him.

Good Friday (Matthew 27:27-31)




Then the governor's soldiers took Jesus into the Praetorium and gathered the whole cohort of soldiers around him. They stripped him and put a scarlet robe on him. They twisted together a crown of thorns and put it on his head. They put a staff in his right hand, knelt in front of him, and mocked him by saying, "Hail, King of the Jews!" They spit on him, took the staff, and hit him repeatedly on his head.

After they had mocked him, they took off the robe and put his own clothes on him. Then they led him away to crucify him.

Easter Morning (Matthew 28:1-10)

After the Sabbath, at dawn on the first day of the week, Mary Magdalene and the other Mary went to look at the tomb. Suddenly, there was a great earthquake! For an angel of the Lord came down from heaven, and going to the tomb, he rolled away the stone and was sitting on it. His appearance was like lightning, and his clothing was as white as snow. The guards were so terrified of him that they shook and became like dead men.



The angel said to the women, "Do not be afraid! I know that you are looking for Jesus, who was crucified. He is not here. He has risen, just as he said. Come, see the place where the Lord lay. Go quickly and tell his disciples, 'He has risen from the dead! And look, he is going ahead of you to Galilee. There you will see him.' See, I have told you!"

They hurried away from the tomb, with fear and great joy, and ran to tell his disciples. Suddenly Jesus met them and said, "Greetings!" They approached, took hold of his feet, and worshipped him.

Then Jesus said to them, "Do not be afraid. Go, tell my brothers that they should go to Galilee, and there they will see me."



Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ-My Peace Family,

"I rejoiced with those who said to me, "Let us go to the house of the LORD." I have never felt such sorrow and such eagerness overwhelm my heart at the same time when I meditate upon these words of God. Many of you have expressed to me how heartbroken you are at not being able to gather together for worship here at church, especially to receive the Lord's Supper. This is not in a million years how I expected my first Lent, Holy Week, Easter and Confirmation Day at Peace to happen. And perhaps never in our lifetime have so many things been so apparent.

COVID-19 is being used by God to keep one of his promises I hold dear to my heart. "And we know that in all things God works for the good of those who love him, who have been called according to his purpose." Life is fleeting and fragile. "The wages of sin (and the consequence of living in a sin-cursed world) is death." But "even though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death I will fear no evil, for you are with me, your rod and your staff, they comfort me." Perhaps never have any of us dealt with such radical changes to the way we live our lives in so short a time frame. But leave it to God to single-handedly-no only as his hands can do-strip away everything our world holds so dear-travel, sports, busyness, school, work, and much, much more. And in so doing, God is leading us as his children to realize some very important truths.

Even with all of the uncertainty and change in the world around us, "Jesus Christ is the same yesterday and today and forever." That means the spiritual salvation facts of Holy Week and Easter remain unchanged. Jesus' death on the cross has finished the saving work necessary to forgive our sins and get us into heaven. The blessings of that cross are still given to each of us personally in, with and under the bread and wine in the Lord's Supper. Our sins are fully and freely forgiven by Christ. We can be certain of that because Christ is risen, he is risen indeed. Rest assured, dear friends, when, according to his will, the Lord allows us to gather for worship again, we WILL have the Lord's Supper. We WILL have both children and adults confirmed in their Christian faith. And most certainly, we WILL celebrate together with triumphant songs of joy the resurrection of our Lord. For Christ is risen! He is risen indeed! Alleluia!

Bearing Fruit in a Time of Need

Dr. Rodney Stark estimates that Christianity grew an average of 40% per decade for the first few centuries of its existence. To put that in perspective, if WELS grew at that rate, in two generations we would have over two million members. How did that happen? Christianity was started by misfits of the Roman Empire. Early believers worshiped in homes. Becoming a Christian made it likely you would experience ridicule or even persecution. How does Christianity explode in *those* circumstances?

The gospel. The gospel was entirely unique. There were plenty of religions that talked about powerful gods who demanded sacrifices. The gospel told of an all-powerful God who became weak and sacrificed himself for you. Other religions offered some version of life after death, but it was always conditional: do good work, get a good eternity. The gospel offered physical resurrection and eternity in paradise entirely on the basis of Christ's work, not your own. His death and his resurrection meant you had assurance *now*. You faced death confidently, knowing you were going to a better place.

St. Paul wrote to the Colossians, "The gospel is bearing fruit and growing throughout the whole world" (1:6). The power and beauty of the gospel—that is what caused the early church to explode.

However, that doesn't tell the whole story. It wasn't simply that the early Christians proclaimed the gospel. By the way they lived their lives, they gained an audience for the gospel.

In the early 4th century, the historian Eusebius wrote about a plague. Healthy people would flee the cities for the safety of the countryside. But one group largely stayed behind–Christians. "All day long, [Christians] tended to the dying and to their burial, countless numbers with no one to care for them." Eusebius states that as people witnessed this compassion, "[the Christians'] deeds were on everyone's lips, and they glorified the God of the Christians." Christians took care of the sick. It didn't matter if the sick person was a Christian or pagan.

Christians cared for the poor too. The Roman Emperor Julian wanted to wipe out Christianity and reinstitute emperor worship. After a few years of trying, Julian wrote a letter to a pagan priest in which he explained why he now believed Christianity would take over the empire. "[Christians] support not only their poor, but ours as well. All men see that our people lack aid from us." When people would ask Christians, "Why do you do what you do?" they could share the gospel.

COVID-19 is awful. Many are going to die. The economies of the world are a mess. However, it's also an amazing opportunity to serve Christ by serving our fellow man in whatever way they need, such as:

- -Contact all the at-risk residents on your block and offer to make all their grocery store runs for them.
- -Offer to watch the child of a health care worker when they need to work.
- -Pick up your dinner from a local restaurant that could go out of business in the lockdown.
- -Is there a single person you know, perhaps a widow or widower? Set aside some time to talk to them on the phone. Have your kids do the same.
- -If the federal government ends up giving funds and you don't really need it to survive, give yours away to others who are hit harder by the economic downturn or to your favorite charity.

As we seize those God-given opportunities to serve our neighbor, perhaps Christ will give us another opportunity—to share why we do what we do . . . to share the hope we have.

Let us be the ones who step up first to meet the needs of those around us. Let us be the ones to explain why we need not fear anything. Let us do all this, not because we want to grow by 40 percent. Let us do this simply because we are the body of Christ. We do what he would do. And we want him glorified. "They glorified the God of the Christians."

In these challenging days ahead, may the Spirit strengthen your faith with his unbreakable promises. May Christ give you health and compassion.

Empty Tomb Rolls

Make these rolls to remember that Jesus is not in the tomb- He is Risen!

1 can refrigerated crescent rolls

8 large marshmallows

¼ cup butter, melted

¼ cup sugar

1 Tbs cinnamon

Line a baking sheet with a silicone liner, parchment paper, or non-stick foil.

Combine sugar and cinnamon in a small bowl and set aside.

Unroll and separate crescent rolls. Dip a marshmallow in the melted butter, then roll in cinnamon/sugar mixture. Place the covered marshmallow on a raw crescent roll. Pinch the dough around the marshmallow, completely covering marshmallow. Pinch seams to seal well. Be sure to seal the seams completely, or the marshmallow will melt all over the baking sheet.

Place on prepared baking sheet. Brush tops of rolls with some of the leftover butter and sprinkle with additional cinnamon/sugar mixture.

Bake at 375°F for 12-14 minutes. Let cool for 2-3 minutes before removing rolls from baking sheet. Serve warm.

NOTE: Some of the melted marshmallow may leak during baking, but the roll should still form a hollow tomb. Pinch seams tightly to reduce oozing.

Symbolism:

White marshmallow = body of Jesus (perfect)
Melted butter = oils used to anoint Jesus' body
Cinnamon = spices used to anoint Jesus' body
Crescent roll (well sealed) = sealed tomb

Hollow roll (after baking) = empty tomb after Christ's resurrection
