



Happy Thanksgiving???

Think about that first Thanksgiving celebration. The pilgrims fled religious persecution in England. Those pilgrims endured a 66 day journey from Europe to the new world. During the trip, many of them died. But when they got to the new land, their troubles were just beginning. The winter that year was extremely harsh. These people were not equipped to survive in the wilderness by hunting, fishing, trapping or even growing crops. Even more of them perished in the winter weather. In spring by the grace of God an Indian named Samoset helped the pilgrims learn to live off the land and farm using fish for fertilizer. That fall, the pilgrims and the Indians gathered for a three-day feast and festival to thank God for allowing them to survive and prosper in this new land.

Does that sound familiar? The Israelites were freed from Egypt by the LORD's mighty hand. Their journey to the Promised Land was fraught with danger, some of it their own sinful doing. But when they reached Israel the problems were not over yet. They still had to drive out the heathen nations inhabiting the land to make it their own. But through it all, God remained with them in gracious protecting and providing love. The Lord raised up leaders for his people in Moses and Aaron. God's pillar of fire and cloud led his people night and day. Manna from heaven fed their bodies. The bronze snake healed them from certain death. Water came from a rock—twice!—to quench their thirst.

And what does our journey through life look like? It is no less full of ups and downs than Israel's or the pilgrims of the first Thanksgiving. We daily sin much and surely deserve nothing but punishment. Family disappoints us and we have problems with them. Friends sometimes desert us at the worst times. Death tears people from us. Our own sins sting our hearts. Life this side of heaven is a challenging journey. But we know exactly how and where that journey ends: with Jesus in heaven. No matter what happens to us between now and next Thanksgiving, even if we die, we know things will be all right. We know Jesus is with us on our journey every step of the way. He holds us in the palm of his hand even when danger and troubles threaten all around us. Trust in your Savior. Thank God for him and for all of your earthly and heavenly blessings today!

Hallelujah!

Psalm 118 is an "Hallelujah" psalm, meaning "Praise the LORD!" Long ago, God's people sang the words of this psalm toward the end of their Passover meal. It is the custom in North America to gather this time of year to celebrate *Thanksgiving*. Even when times are tough, Jesus proves that his love for us endures forever.

Home Missions Funds Three New Missions



WELS Board for Home Missions met in September and authorized funding for three new missions as well as two restarts. An additional congregation will receive support from Home Missions but no funding.

"Moved by the love of our Savior, Home Missions wanted to move forward because we know the Lord hasn't directed us to just share the gospel when life is humming along but to share the gospel of Jesus Christ in difficult times as well," says Rev. Keith Free, administrator of WELS Board for Home Missions. The new missions being funded include:

- Amarillo, Texas: Located 130 miles from the nearest WELS church, a group of 15 members form the core group reaching out in Amarillo. The pastor from Lubbock comes to Amarillo twice a month.
- North Liberty, lowa: This is a multi-site ministry with Good Shepherd, Cedar Rapids. A dedicated group of 20 began worshiping in July 2017 at a community center. Home Missions funding will allow Good Shepherd to call a second pastor to help its outreach efforts.
- West San Antonio, Texas: Ten families from Our Savior, San Antonio make up the core group at this new mission, which began worshiping together in March 2020. They held three in-person services with an average of 40 in attendance before the pandemic hit.

The three restarts that Home Missions is now supporting include Dix Hills, N.Y.; Santa Clarita, Calif.; and Burlington, Iowa (unsubsidized).


