Continue In What You Have Learned!

How much do you remember of what you learned in elementary school? On the show "Are You Smarter than a 5th Grader?", adult contestants are pitted against 5th grade students in a test of knowledge. If you have ever tried to play along from home, it might surprise you to see just how much knowledge from that part of your life has slipped your mind. Without a need for those bits of information, our brains get rid of them in favor of keeping more useful things.

But in one case, we always want to be reviewing and learning from information given to us from a very young age. We want it to be a part of us, saturating every aspect of our lives. Through Paul, the Holy Spirit tells us, *"But as for you, continue in what you have learned and become convinced of, because you know those from whom you learned it."* When it comes to God's Word, it is vital for all of us to follow Paul's advice.

What is the purpose of the Bible? If you ask people to answer that question, the answers you get might surprise you. People may see the Bible as an instruction manual, a marriage therapist, or a parenting manual, but rarely for what it truly is.

Others take a different, but no less false, view of the Good Book. They try to pick the Bible apart, seeking to figure out who really wrote and assembled it. Every word is open to debate. They are happy to disagree on everything but one point: the whole Bible is not God's Word.

Many people do not want the Bible to be God's Word. Sadly, God told us these things would happen. *"For the time will come when men will not put up with sound doctrine. Instead, to suit their own desires, they will gather around them a great number of teachers to say what their itching ears want to hear."* They want it to be whatever they make of it, as long as it is not offensive or troubling to their conscience. "How good does the Bible make me feel?" becomes a primary concern. The Bible is a book viewed totally differently by the world and by believers.

We understand the true purpose of the Bible. The Holy Spirit has led us to trust the Bible for what it really is: the pure and completely true mistake-free Word of God himself. *"How from in-fancy you have known the Holy Scriptures, which are able to make you wise for salvation through faith in Christ Jesus."* The Bible was not written by individuals with their own social or political agendas. *"For prophecy never had its origin in the will of man, but men spoke from God as they were carried along by the Holy Spirit."* The Bible is the road map to heaven. Its entire message can be summed up in one word, one name: Jesus. In the Old Testament, prophets heralded the coming Messiah, the Savior who would usher in the kingdom of God. Then, in the New Testament, this Savior burst into the fabric of space and time to save us from our sins. All of Scripture finds its fulfillment in the death of Christ on the cross to forgive our sins and his resurrection which grants to us everlasting life in heaven.

When you or your children were younger, many of us had to have braces put on our teeth. These painful devices were used to straighten our crooked teeth and make them straight. The Bible serves the same purpose in our lives. It helps us see how crooked our lives have become with our sins. But then the Bible points us to the perfectly straight life of Jesus for our forgiveness. *"All Scripture is God-breathed and is useful for teaching, rebuking, correcting and training in righteousness."* That righteousness is Jesus doing everything necessary to make us righteous.

God's Word does serve as a guide for us, but only to see Jesus as the solution to our crooked lives of sin. Only when the gospel of Jesus forgiving our sins with his perfect life and death, then rising from death to forever defeat it, is the focus of our faith lives, are we properly using the Bible. Continue in what you have learned until you reach the perfect knowledge of life in heaven!



They often embarrassed their mother by the way they acted in public. It seemed to her that her sons were always arguing. At the supermarket, the brothers would fight about which cereal she should buy. When they were home they could never agree which movie to watch. Sometimes she doubted that her two boys would ever survive their childhood together.

While they often bickered, the brothers were also fiercely loyal to each other. If another child from the neighborhood made fun of one of them, the other was sure to come to his defense. It baffled their mother! How could they quarrel so, yet a short time later seek to protect their would-be rival? Blood truly must be thicker than water!

This scenario is a reality for many of us. Sibling rivalry, it seems, is universal. And for the most part, defense of one's own family is equally universal. Playground conversations usually prove this true.

God has another scenario he wants us to follow. He encourages us in the Bible to treat all people as though they were family. *"Make every effort to add to your faith ... brotherly kindness"* (2 Peter 1:5,7).

There are dozens of things that make each of us different from everyone else in the world. They include where we live, the color of our eyes, our talents, the size of our paycheck, and so on. Even though we enjoy associating with people who are like us, God wants us to treat everyone the way we would treat an idolized brother or sweet sister. After all, God's love prompted him to send his Son, so that *everyone* who believes in him has life in his name. Blood is not always thicker than water.

Thoughts on the Synod Convention

The format was different, but the purpose and results were unchanged.

The 66th Biennial Convention of the Wisconsin Evangelical Lutheran Synod was held at Luther Preparatory School, Watertown, Wis., on July 26-28. Last January, the potential restrictions of the COVID-19 pandemic led the Conference of Presidents to alter the format and location of the convention. The location was moved from Michigan Lutheran Seminary, Saginaw, Mich., to Luther Preparatory School because of the more stringent restrictions existing in Michigan at the time. The format was changed to a include about 20 percent of the delegates as in-person delegates, with the remaining delegates participating virtually. Elections and floor committee work was done via videoconference prior to the convention.

All things considered, the convention itself took place without significant problems with communication or participation by the virtual delegates.

The opening worship provided an inspiring start to the convention and focused on the convention theme "Here we stand." The convention theme recalled the 500th anniversary of Martin Luther's bold stance on the Scriptures at the Diet of Worms in 1521. Rev. Joel Voss, second vice president of the synod, preached the sermon.

Some significant items of business that were addressed:

- Rev. James Huebner was reelected to another four-year term as the first vice president of the synod; Rev. Robert Pasbrig was reelected as the synod's recording secretary.
- President Earle Treptow of Wisconsin Lutheran Seminary delivered the convention essay reviewing the significance of Luther's confession and its importance for the church today.
- The convention approved the synod's Ministry Financial Plan, which outlines the financial support for the work of the synod for the next two years. Chief Financial Officer Mr. Kyle Egan also reported that the synod ended last year in very good financial shape in all areas.
- The proposed change in the synod's pension plan from a defined benefit plan to a defined contribution plan was approved and will be implemented on Jan. 1, 2022.
- The convention endorsed an ambitious plan by the Board for Home Missions to open 100 new missions over ten years, beginning in 2023.
- The convention was introduced to the new WELS hymnal and formally adopted it as the synod's hymnal. The new hymnal will be available in early fall.

Many other reports outlined and celebrated the many blessings that God has graciously given to our synod during the past two years and the many opportunities he is giving us for continuing to spread the message of Christ to the world.

The next convention is scheduled to be held at Michigan Lutheran Seminary, Saginaw, Mich., in 2023.
