Why a Wreath?

We are all familiar with the traditional Christmas wreath. Many of us even have one hanging on our door. Why a wreath?


The Christmas wreath is made from holly branches. The holly plant grows a beautiful, white flower not too different from an Easter Lilly. That pure white flower symbolizes the purity and holiness of Jesus, who was born without sin.

The holly plant also produces bright red berries with juice that will stain almost anything. Those berries symbolize the blood that Jesus shed on the cross in order to pay for our sins and grant us forgiveness.

The holly leaves also have sharp points, reminiscent of the thorns which were used by the Roman soldiers to make a crown for Jesus. To mimic that crown, the holly branches are often woven together to form a circle. The circle is also a symbol of eternity which we will inherit because of what Jesus Christ did for us.

The Christmas wreath, therefore, is a symbol of our Savior Jesus, the reason for the season. He was pure and holy, yet he shed his blood to forgive us. As part of his suffering he wore a crown of thorns. So the next time you see a Christmas wreath or hang one on your door, remember what it symbolizes and say a prayer of thanks that Jesus would come to this earth as a baby and let himself be killed so that we could live. Someday in heaven, we'll be able to thank him face to face.

OWLS Convention Re-Cap

The Organization of WELS Lutheran Seniors (OWLS) was thrilled to gather in New Ulm, Minn., on Oct. 19-22 for its annual convention. The theme was "We will tell the next generation the praiseworthy deeds of the Lord."

Daily worship, workshops, and keynote presentations focused on the theme of telling the next generation.

The OWLS used its offerings to support the WELS European Civilian chaplaincy, which serves military personnel and civilians in Europe. This year, the OWLS presented them with a check for \$53,300. One of the goals of the OWLS is to increase awareness of its ministry within local congregations.

Long-time OWLS members welcomed a number of first-time attendees to the convention this year.

The 2022 OWLS convention will be held Oct. 11-13 at the Stoney Creek Hotel and Convention Center in Onalaska, Wis. The convention is open to all seniors in WELS and the Evangelical Lutheran Synod, regardless of OWLS membership. Learn more about the OWLS at wels.net/owls.



The Advent Gift

Lord Jesus, you are the light of the world; The light no darkness can overcome. Let your light scatter the darkness; Let it shine in our hearts and lives. Amen.

Imagine a pie perfectly baked: with a crisp, flaky crust; a warm, fruit-filled middle. Imagine a gift perfectly given: from someone who cares for us deeply, who knows exactly what we need. To bake a perfect pie takes years of experience. To give a perfect gift takes careful thought.

God's plan for our salvation did not begin during the course of time. God's plan for our salvation comes from eternity. Two days before His betrayal, Jesus spoke of His return:

"When the Son of Man comes in His glory, and all His angels with Him, He will sit on His throne in heavenly glory... Then the King will say to those on His right, 'Come, you who are blessed by My Father; take your inheritance, the kingdom prepared for you since the creation of the world.'" (Matthew 25:31, 34)

As we celebrate the birth of Jesus, we see how God's perfect, eternal plan was brought to its fulfillment. Our changeless God has carried out His plan to bring us into the kingdom He has prepared for us.

When we go Christmas shopping, we sometimes look for gifts that are costly. We may give such gifts because of the love we have for someone. God's gift of our salvation also had to be purchased. The guilt of our sins was great. A price needed to be paid. Left to ourselves, we would be unable to pay that price. But God's gift of our salvation means that God Himself would pay the price for our sins' guilt. This work of Jesus is called redemption. The payment Jesus made was His life for ours. We are the ones redeemed, and now we are forgiven.

In Him we have redemption through His blood, the forgiveness of sins. (Ephesians 1:7)

There is a limit to the number of gifts we can give to others. Although our heart may want to give more, eventually we will run out of money. But there is no limit to the gifts that God can give. All of us needed the redemption that came by Christ Jesus, and he won it for all.

There is no difference, for all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God, and are justified freely by His grace through the redemption that came by Christ Jesus. (Romans 3:22-24)

The good news of forgiveness in Jesus is one gift that we can share freely with all people. No matter who it is, no matter what they have done, we can share this good news with anyone: **Jesus died for you.**

God prepared his Advent gift to us in a way that we would not look for something else that we thought was better. God prepared his Advent gift to us in such a way that we would see the goodness of the giver and the perfection of the gift. God's own Son – wrapped in flesh, placed into our world – is exactly the gift we needed.

Christ Jesus, being in very nature God, did not consider equality with God something to be grasped, but made Himself nothing, taking the very nature of a servant, being made in human likeness. And being found in appearance as a man, He humbled Himself and became obedient to death even death on a cross! (Phil 2:5-8)

Through the repentance that the Holy Spirit works in our hearts, we admit that we are unworthy of any of God's gifts. Through that same work of repentance, we look to Jesus as the one gift we need. The gift God prepared, He also presented. The gift God promised, He also fulfilled. And He did so at just the right time. Jesus was born at just the right time.

"When the time had fully come, God sent his Son" (Galatians 4:4).

God announced the arrival of His gift by sending angels. The angel announced to Joseph:

"Joseph son of David, do not be afraid to take Mary home as your wife, because what is conceived in her is from the Holy Spirit. She will give birth to a son, and you are to give Him the name Jesus, because He will save His people from their sins." All this took place to fulfill what the Lord had said through the prophet: "The virgin will be with child and will give birth to a son, and they will call Him Immanuel" —which means, "God with us." (Matthew 1:20-23)

The angel Gabriel had already appeared to Mary.

Gabriel said, "Do not be afraid, Mary, you have found favor with God. You will be with child and give birth to a son, and you are to give Him the name Jesus. He will be great and will be called the Son of the Most High. The Lord God will give Him the throne of His father David, and He will reign over the house of Jacob forever; His kingdom will never end." "How will this be," Mary asked the angel, "since I am a virgin?" The angel answered, "The Holy Spirit will come upon you, and the power of the Most High will overshadow you. So the holy one to be born will be called the Son of God." (Luke 1:30-35)

Through God's Word, we renew our faith this Advent and Christmas so that we find our Savior born in Bethlehem and, trusting in Him for full and free forgiveness, receive this precious gift to our eternal benefit.
